Rho Chapter Raises Campaign Goal to \$1.1 Million

s you all have heard over the past few weeks, we are thrilled with the early success of Rho Chapter's Securing the Next Century campaign to purchase the house on Greek Way. With more than 781,080 in commitments, we are well on our way to reaching our initial \$1 million goal and purchasing this facility. The alumni who have made early commitments are staying true to Sigma Pi's mission of inspiring, promoting, and supporting the development of our brothers, and we are calling upon the rest of the brotherhood to follow their lead.

Due to Rho's strong response, we have increased our fundraising goal to \$1.1 million. Any additional dollars to the \$1 million needed for the down payment will put Rho in a much better position for the start of its second century. In addition to being a financially sound chapter, the extra funds will further improve the chapter house, such as small renovation work, preparing a maintenance fund for capital expenditures, or reducing the long-term debt on the property.

Sam was thrilled that his younger brother, Bill Monroe '71, decided to follow in his footsteps to Sigma Pi. Bill and Sam both held multiple leadership positions as Rho undergraduates, including Sage. The Monroe brothers have fond memories of the chapter house on Clark Avenue, and it's important to them that future generations of Brothers reap the rewards of the Sigma Pi experience at our brotherhood's new home at 3408 Greek Way. "I was intrigued by the thought of making it possible for the chapter to remain vibrant and continue shaping lives," Sam said. "The current size of the fraternity is a tribute to how the brotherhood has carried on."

The leadership skills Bill developed paid off as he worked his way through Design School and went on to start his own architectural firm in Charlotte, WGM Design. He has been heavily involved in the American Institute of Architects and was the NC Chapter President in 1997 and received an Honorary Doctorate of Human Letters Degree from Belmont Abbey College for his work there.

Sam got his start in the oil and gas industry with the help of Big Dave Johnson '67. "He was my job visit sponsor in Baton Rouge on a job recruiting trip. He worked for the company that made a gas additive, tetraethyl lead," Sam said. "I asked about the company's future. He

told me not to work for them because they would soon go out of business, though at the time they were thriving. He taught me to think strategically and out of the box." Sam took his advice and entered the petroleum engineering world and had assignments in Louisiana, Texas, Saudi Arabia, and is now president of Eagle Petroleum in California.

Sam and Bill are both happily married with grown children and have 12 grandchildren between them. Aside from his wife and Sam, Bill considers his senior year roommate and 2nd Counselor, Jim Baggs '72, to be his best friend.

"I know I can count on Jim at any time,in fact, I could call many of the brothers and get their help, if needed. That is the meaning of brotherhood."

Rho Remains Committed to Suicide Awareness and Prevention

Rho's philanthropic efforts have been rejuvenated in recent years and have been centered around suicide awareness and prevention. In the fall of 2019, we joined Triangle Survivors of Suicide to host a 5K walk/run and raised \$30,000 for community organizations that are united in our cause. While we were disappointed that the Break the Silence 5K that we co-host each spring with Phi Delta Theta was canceled this year due to COVID-19, we're hopeful to resume the tradition in 2021. The 2019 Break the Silence 5K raised more than \$12,000 for the NCSU counseling center. Rho has also enjoyed expanding its philanthropic endeavors over the past year to volunteering with the Museum of Science Ecostation fossil dig, Walnut Creek Wetland Center restoration, Miracle League of the Triangle, Shakori Hills Grassroots Festival of Music and Dance, and the SPCA of Raleigh.
